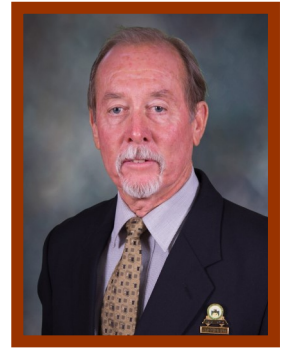

Shire's Road Works Update

Ten Kilometres (10km) of sealing was completed on Menzies North Road bringing the total towards Lake Ballard to 43km. Work continued on the first 5km of Evanston Menzies Road with sealing to be carried out early in 2022. The road at Marmion Village was set out ready for construction early in 2022.



Maintenance grading was completed on the western end of Evanston Menzies Road, Bullfinch Road and other roads in the vicinity. Grading was also carried out close to Menzies, with roads at Kookynie and fire breaks in Menzies being completed.

Try a Trade Pilot Project Colab successfully launches within the Leonora Community...

Our first collaborative trial CDP Project TRY A TRADE was successfully launched on the 29th November 2021 within the Leonora Community after close consultation with participants, stakeholders and local community members.

This trial-based pilot was led and delivered through Central Regional TAFE, providing innovative new ways of direct remote community-based training and education delivery.

Recognition of training was given through Nationally Recognised Certification.

Careful planning with Central Regional TAFE ensured we delivered a tailored approach to different age cohort needs, building on employability - igniting a career in trades pathways!

We were proud to partner with Central Regional TAFE, Leonora Youth Centre and Leonora District High School and aim to replicate this concept across the Yaaliku Region for 2022/23 as we transition to the new Remote Jobs Model.

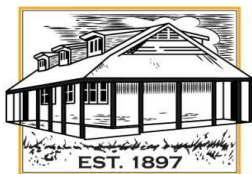
Attendance

Annual Regional Visit

Kidsafe WA is visiting your region!

February 14th – 18th 2022

Take advantage of the range of services offered by Kidsafe WA while we are in your area. Kidsafe WA focuses on preventing unintentional childhood injuries at home, at play and on the road. There is generally limited accessibility to these services for regional parents, carers, and professionals so Kidsafe WA are undertaking annual regional visits.

Workshops and Services

Professional Development:

This workshop focuses on the priority areas and the risk factors that contribute to unintentional injuries in children 0-15 years of age, specific to your region. It is targeted at child & school health nurses, injury prevention, health promotion & population health officers, allied health staff and childcare workers. (45 minutes – 1 hour)

Keeping Kids Safe:

This workshop focuses on common injuries in children that occur around the home, at play or on the road. It covers the methods to prevent these injuries and relevant basic first aid. Targeted at parents, carers, grandparents and community members. (45 minutes – 1 hour)

School Safety:

An interactive classroom incursion for students in years 1, 2 and 3, covering the topics of safety on the road, safety in the home and safety at play. (45 minutes)

Naturally Kids Play:

For information about the benefits of natural playspaces, how they relate to the Australian Standards and how you can creatively design your own playspace, join us for a photographic journey using uniquely Australian photos! The importance of the new National Quality Standards and the Early Years Learning Framework are discussed. (1.5 hours)

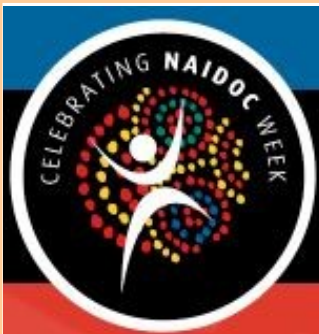

Fire blankets

Fire blankets can be used to extinguish small fires in the home, garage or caravan. Fire blankets can also be used to wrap around a person whose clothes have caught fire.

Store fire blankets in or next to the kitchen. Do not store fire blankets next to or above a stove.

Using a fire blanket

Before use, read the manufacturer's instructions. Everyone in your household should know when and how to use a fire blanket.

Remember, fire blankets should only be used once and then replaced.

Fire Blankets and Fire Extinguishers should be inspected every 6 months to ensure that they are fit for purpose.

FIRE BLANKETS

The purpose of this document is to provide information relating to domestic fire blankets as a fire safety measure.

What is a fire blanket?

A fire blanket consists of a piece of fire-resistant fabric (usually woven glass fibre) that can be used to smother a small fire or wrap around a person whose clothing is alight.

Where to store a fire blanket

To be useful, a fire blanket should be easily and quickly available. Fire blankets are often installed in kitchen areas where small cooking fires may occur. Do not place them near the stove as a stove top fire may stop you getting to it. Instead, place the fire blanket near the door way to the kitchen. This will mean you can still leave if the fire escalates.

When to use a fire blanket

A fire blanket is ideal for extinguishing cooking fat fires and can be used to wrap around people if their clothes catch on fire.

How to use a fire blanket

Pull down sharply on the tabs hanging from the bottom of the package to release the fire blanket.



Hold it in front of you, with the fabric rolled back at the edges to protect your hands.



Place (not throw) fire blankets over cooking fat fires, keeping hands and face protected behind it.



Lay the blanket gently over the fire. Do not throw the bottom of the blanket onto the far side of the fire as flames can then run up the blanket to your hands.



Turn off the heat source and leave the blanket over the burnt area for at least 15 minutes or until the heat has dissipated.



Dial 000 to call the fire service.



To put out a clothing fire, wrap the blanket around the flames and person. Get them to drop to the ground and roll until the fire is out. Seek medical assistance.



Australian Standards



Your fire blankets should be Australian Standards approved — AS/NZS 3504:2006 - Fire blankets. It must measure no less than 1 metre by 1 metre.

If a person's clothing catches on fire, they should:



Stop immediately.
Running will fan the flames.



Drop to the ground.



Cover their face with their hands to avoid breathing in flames and smoke.



Roll back and forth on the ground to extinguish the flames.



To assist a person with burning clothing, roll them back and forth on the ground or smother the flames with a fire blanket.

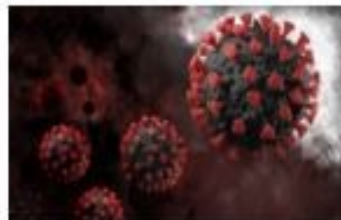

Scanning the QR code below will also help answer some common questions.

SEVEN GOLDEN RULES FOR PROSPECTING

1.

Put safety first

- Make sure you have enough water, fuel, maps and first aid supplies.
- Give serious consideration to taking some form of telecommunications and a global positioning system to fix locations, and a Personal Locator Beacon (PLB) – it may turn out to be your most important safety device.

2.

Obtain a Miner's Right permit

when prospecting on vacant Crown land (\$25 from any Mining Registrar's office).

3.

Obtain a 40E permit

prior to prospecting within an exploration tenement (if you don't have written permission from the tenement holder).

4.

Get written permission

from the tenement holder when prospecting on:

- a mining lease
- an exploration licence (if you don't have a 40E permit)
- a prospecting licence

5.

Comply with all legal requirements

when prospecting on a pastoral lease. You cannot prospect within 100 metres of any occupied building or within 400 metres of any livestock watering point without the consent of the pastoralist.

6.

Show respect when on Crown land

because it is used by other people or set aside for many purposes.

7.

Fill any holes

that you dug and repair ground that has been disturbed.

1080 BAITING IN THIS AREA IS A RISK TO DOMESTIC PETS

Please be advised that baiting programs using 1080 poison are carried out across Western Australia, including this area, and are aimed at controlling wild dogs, feral cats, feral pigs, foxes and rabbits. The poison baits remain toxic for many months. You need to exercise caution. Domestic pets should be kept close and under control at all times. Owners may consider the use of leads and muzzles for their domestic pets.

Baits are not intentionally laid in public areas such as road reserves, parking bays, rest stops or roadhouses however can be inadvertently moved into these areas by animals and birds.
