On March 27, I participated in a Councillors training session led by Mr. Steven Tweedie, alongside other available Councillors. This session was pivotal in enhancing our collective skills and knowledge, ultimately fostering effective governance within our community.

Following the Easter break, I continued my commitment to engagement and collaboration by attending a meeting at the Western Australian Local Government Association (WALGA) in Perth. While in Perth, I took the opportunity, accompanied by Cr Sudhir, to explore tiny homes, including a tour of Fleetwood Homes. This exploration hinted at potential considerations for alternative housing options within our community, reflecting our proactive approach to addressing housing needs.

On April 9, I attended a discussion concerning the initiation of works related to the valve and dam wall at Niagara Dam.

Lastly, on April 18, all Councillors, including myself, attended a presentation by Wander Consulting on having a gala dinner at Lake Ballard. Following this, we engaged in a budget workshop together with the CEO and the Shire senior staff members.

Work has continued to repair flood damage in the Kookynie area. Malcolm Road is opened to traffic and is back in good condition. Kookynie Yarri Road and Cranky Jack Road have been graded and are in reasonable condition. Mt Remarkable Road is still closed and under repair, though work is progressing well and can be travelled by persons with a real necessity.

Both contract workers and Shire staff have been employed on the repair work.

Roads to the West of the Goldfields Highway are all in reasonable condition.

Depot staff have done a good job of mowing and trimming weed and grass growth throughout Menzies.

Various signs around Menzies and Kookynie are currently being replaced, though orders can take some time to fill.

We have employed a gardener on a casual basis and good progress is being made on garden beds and trees around town.

We are still experiencing problems with our garbage truck. Where necessary staff are collecting rubbish alternatively. Some delays in collection are being experienced.

Fencing of Goongarrie cottages has been priced and it is expected work will be carried out shortly. Once fencing is completed some restoration can be carried out as time permits.

Pricing and engineering details are still not complete for Water Park roof, but this will be completed as soon as possible.

Raubex and Main Roads are still using the depot yard whilst Highway work is underway.

A price has been agreed to for sealing of footpaths at Marmion Village and this work should be completed during May of this year.

CCTV has been installed around town and covers large areas so that much of the town is able to be monitored.

### MULLINE DAVYHURST ROAD

On Wednesday, 24<sup>th</sup> April 2024, Council resolved to allow Ora Banda Mining to temporarily closed Mulline Davyhurst Road between their haul road at Davyhurst and the intersection with Evanston Menzies Road. The closure is to allow for heavy haulage vehicles to use the road for the purpose of hauling ore from Riverina mine to the Davyhurst mill. The closure will be reviewed each May and extended

at Council's discretion for as long as necessary.

Commencing June 1<sup>st</sup> 2024, members of the public who wish to use the road will need to complete a permit. Permits will be available from the Shire office, Ora Banda's offices at Riverina and Davyhurst and at each end of the closed road. The permit will be a simple form informing the applicant of any dangers or special conditions along the road and will require date, name and vehicle registration to be completed. The form will need to be placed in a box provided at one of the placed afore mentioned. Permits will also be able to be applied for on line. Permits will generally be for three days, though for regular users permits of a longer duration may be apply.

### **Stop the interruptions - take back your phone from telemarketers and spam**

Unwanted calls and spam SMS can be a source of frustration. Whether it's persistent telemarketers interrupting your dinner or irrelevant promotional texts flooding your phone, there are ways to put a stop to them.

You may have forgotten about the Do Not Call register, which is a free service run by the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA). You can register your home, personal mobile or fax number online via [donotcall.gov.au](http://donotcall.gov.au) or call 1300 792 958. The good news is you only need to register once.

Telemarketers then have 30 days to stop contact. The *Do Not Call Register* legislation applies not only to Australian telemarketers but also businesses within Australia that use overseas-based telemarketers and businesses based overseas making calls to Australian numbers.

The register works by requiring telemarketers to submit a list of phone numbers they wish to call to the Register Operator. The Register identifies any numbers that are not permitted to be called and they are removed from calling lists.

Keep in mind research or survey related calls are not telemarketing, so you may still receive these, as well as calls from registered political parties, politicians, government agencies, election candidates, registered charities or educational institutions where you are or were a student. These are all exempt. However, there are still rules to be followed.

Telemarketers can only call between 9am-8pm Monday-Friday and 9am-5pm on Saturdays and never on Sundays. Researchers can call 9am-8.30pm Monday-Friday and 9am-5pm on Saturday and Sundays. Neither can call on a national public holiday.

The caller must tell you their name, the name of their employer and why they are calling and their caller ID must not be blocked. They also must end the call if you ask them to.

Unfortunately scam calls won't stop after registration. A legitimate caller should not mind if you want to verify their identity. You should never give an unsolicited caller any personal or financial information, including credit card details, or access to your computer.

Receiving an SMS about a sale from your favourite clothing store is helpful but when do 'helpful' texts turn into unwanted spam?

Marketing texts must also follow rules set out by ACMA. The business needs to have your consent, for example you ticked 'subscribe' on a form or entered a competition, include contact details and offer a way for you to unsubscribe or opt-out.

After you unsubscribe or opt-out the business must generally stop sending marketing texts within five days.

You can report spam messages to ACMA by forwarding the message to their dedicated SMS line – 0429 999 888, or you can report it online via ACMA's spam complaint form. Also consider blocking the number on your phone. ACMA does take action and most recently issued penalties of over \$3.7 million to Luxottica (Sunglass Hut, Oakley, OPSM), Uber Australia, Kmart Australia and Ticketek for breaches of spam rules.

And just like with unsolicited calls, you may still receive text messages during elections or from registered charities and other Government bodies.

The flags where raised by Garth Marland and Sam Mazza.

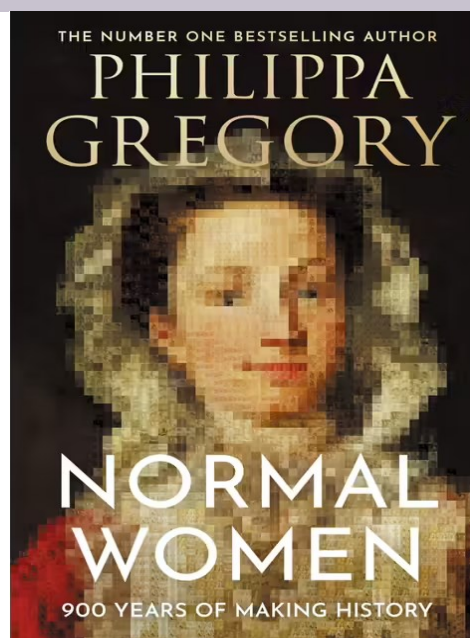
The service was followed by a Gunbarrel breakfast in the Town Hall.

Below are some photos of the activities completed.





This month we take a look back in Our garden. You may recall that we planted some Birdhouse Gourds around September last year, small seeds that I hoped would make it through the Summer months and beyond. I am very pleased to say that survival kicked in for these seedlings and after a few losses , we now have a plant that is surely what most would say is “blooming great.” It is amazing that every morning recently there have been several white flowers that seem to only open through the night . The flowers only last until the sun reaches its zenith, then they wilt away. This is most unique in that most other species in the Squash family only produce yellow flowers not white. There are now 3 very sizeable gourds that astound us with in their growth each day. Every morning we check them out and they seem to have doubled in size. I have included two photos of the gourds three weeks apart , so you can see with your own eyes the remarkable increase in the size and pattern of the skin. Still some 2 or so months away from reaching their full size and ripeness , or until the first frost, that will signal the end of the growing cycle.





Another standout for flowers and growth, this time in 'Orange' is a newly cultivated Cosmos. I purchased these seeds from a supplier as a 'new release' late last year. Another survivor of the hot days, although very demanding of water, this variety is well worth the effort. Currently the plant is above the fence height, some 2 metres, and is literally a mass of Orange flowers along every stem. I am hopeful that they will self seed as do most Cosmos very easily, and if you see one pop up in your garden, you will know who is to blame. I will be collecting the seeds in the coming months so feel free to collect some if you would like. This Cosmos is a real show stopper and great value in the garden also for cut flowers.





With Anzac Day having just passed we all turn to the symbolic flower the Poppy. I have high hopes that the hundreds of seeds that I have sown in the last few weeks will preform this Spring. Scattered throughout the garden in all ranges of pinks and red hues. I am happy to say some are already appearing. Last year was the first attempt at the Californian Poppy, a bright Yellow mass of blooms. Yet another self seeder, the Californian Poppy this year is well underway to putting on a show of colour in the month ahead, while of course supplying food for the bees.

November last year had our Eggplants providing food for the table . These hardy plants are still in the same spot and continue to flower and fruit . Very water wise and a low maintenance food crop, why not try them in your garden. The Eggplant leaves are not at all fond of frost, but after that passes simply remove the effected leaves and watch them reshoot. You should easily get 3 years from each plant before they need to be replaced.





December last year some neighbours returned from Perth with a Paw Paw plant for our garden. Along with another small Paw Paw plant from another local supplier, they both are now for the first time flowering. Both are very tall with a strong base and lots of foliage that seemed to appreciate the hot days and upkeep of water. Again we spend our morning checking to see if the bees have done their job. In the middle of April I discovered that there are fruit forming, very excited for the months ahead.

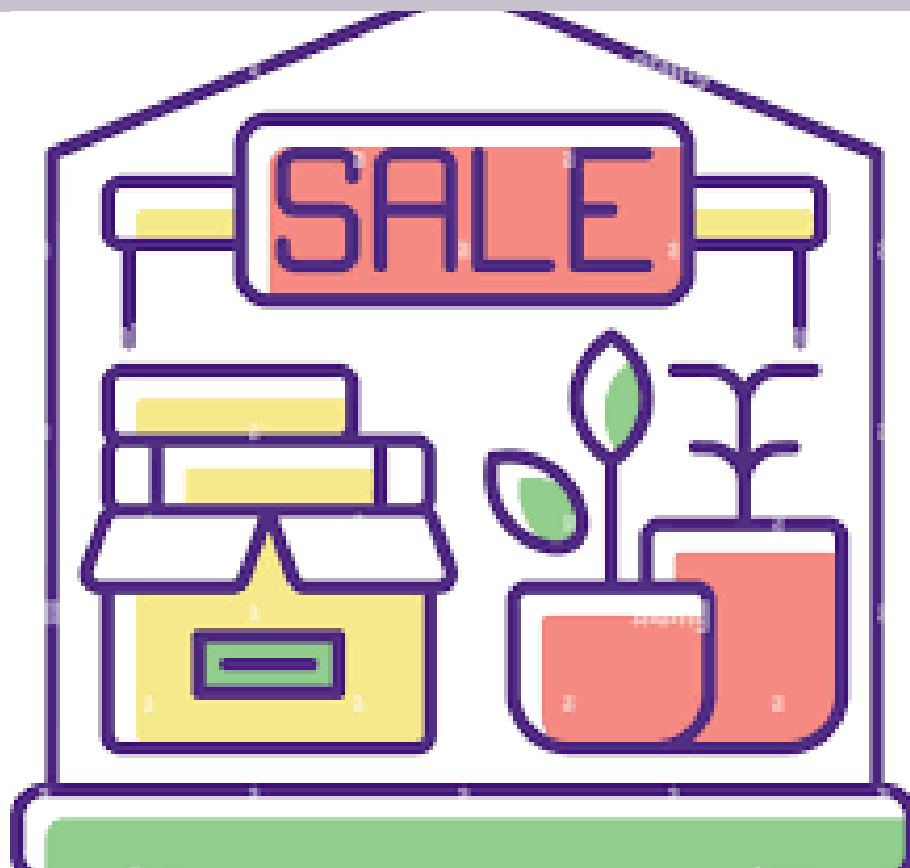




After the rain in March I decided to spread the our compost around in the garden. This has resulted in the appearance of self seeded Celery, Tomatoes, Bok choy , Wild Rocket , Parsley, Coriander, Dill, Chillies, Radish, Pumpkin and Sweet potatoes. Appearing in various spots in the garden adding a little confusion, if not variety to some garden beds. Let me also thank Barry for the worm juice over the past month. It is really improving the soil here proving it is well worth the idea a getting a worm farm started.



Our garden philosophy is to let plants show you where they want to be. If they survived our last Summer surely they can excel in Autumn. Till next month.

The poison baits remain toxic for many months. You need to exercise caution. Domestic pets should be kept close and under control at all times. Owners may consider the use of leads and muzzles for their domestic pets.

1080 baiting is part of an integrated pest management program protecting livestock from death and injury reducing the impact on pastoral and agricultural production, and helping to preserve the unique flora and fauna of WA. Baits are not intentionally laid in public areas such as road reserves, parking bays, rest stops or roadhouses however can be inadvertently moved into these areas by animals and birds.
