
One in eight women in Australia will develop breast cancer in their lifetime. The best time to treat breast cancer is when it is still very small. Having regular mammograms through BreastScreen WA is one of the best things you can do to detect breast cancer early, and improve your chance of survival

BreastScreen WA provides over 100,000 screening mammograms each year to Western Australian women. A screening mammogram is a low dose X-ray of a woman's breast. Screening mammograms are performed on women with no breast symptoms, for the purpose of detecting breast cancer at an early stage before it can be felt or noticed. Screening mammograms are performed on women 40 years or over with no breast symptoms every two years, for the purpose of detecting breast cancer at an early stage before it can be felt or noticed.

Did you know?

- Women in Australia have a 1 in 8 risk of developing breast cancer in their lifetime
- The risk of breast cancer increases with age
- A mammogram can detect up to 90% of breast cancers and is the only proven means
 of detecting breast cancer at this early stage
- Screening mammograms may detect a very small cancer, as small as a grain of rice, before you or your doctor can feel it

Breast cancer cannot be prevented, but the earlier a breast cancer is detected the better the chance of successful treatment

Kidsafe WA with the support of the Department of Health is launching its Spring Seasonal Safety Campaign reminding parents of the simple steps they can take to prevent childhood poisoning.

Poisoning Facts:

- A total of 483 children presented to PMH ED during 2007/08 as the result of poisoning. Last spring alone, 127 children attended PMH ED due to poisoning.
- Many household products are potentially poisonous, including medications, cleaning products, soaps, detergents, gardening products, alcohol, perfume, cigarettes and some plants.
- The most common cause of poisoning is medications. This can occur when a child accesses a medication not suitable for children or consumes too much.
- Most accidental poisonings occur to children less than five years of age, with children aged one to three most at risk.

Childhood poisoning can be easily prevented through minor household modifications, the use of safety equipment, child education and supervision. Poisons: make sure they are locked away in a high cupboard. So get on board and "Spring Clean your home for poisons safety!"

Clubs to receive funding in the goldfields include:



Apple has determined that a very small percentage of iPhone 5 devices may suddenly experience shorter battery life or need to be charged more frequently.

The affected iPhone 5 devices were sold between September 2012 and January 2013 and fall within a limited serial number range.

If your iPhone 5 is experiencing these symptoms and meets the eligibility requirements noted below, Apple will replace your iPhone 5 battery, free of charge.

Eligibility

If your iPhone is in working order and exhibits the symptoms noted above, use the serial number checker at https://ssl.apple.com/support/iphone5-battery/ to see if it is eligible for this program.

Replacement process

Choose one of the service options below to have your battery replaced. Your iPhone will be examined prior to any service to verify that it is eligible for this program and in working order.

Please call your service provider to confirm that battery replacement service is available on the day you visit them.

To prepare your iPhone 5 for the battery replacement process, please follow the steps below:

- Back up your data to iTunes or iCloud
- Turn off Find my iPhone
- Erase data and settings in Settings > General > Reset > Erase all Content and Settings

Note: If your iPhone 5 has any damage such as a cracked screen which impairs the replacement of the battery, that issue will need to be resolved prior to the battery replacement. In some cases, there may be a cost associated with the repair.

Additional Information

Apple may restrict or limit repair to the original country of purchase.

If you believe your iPhone 5 was affected by this issue, and you paid to replace your battery, you can contact Apple about a refund.

This worldwide Apple program doesn't extend the standard warranty coverage of the iPhone 5. The program covers affected iPhone 5 batteries for two years after the first retail sale of the unit or until March 1, 2015, whichever provides longer coverage.

Payment Increase for more than 3.7 million pensioners

8 September 2014: More than 3.7 million pensioners will receive an increase to their payments from 20 September, the second rise this year.

Federal Member for O'Connor Rick Wilson said single age pensioners will receive an increase of up to \$11.50 a fortnight, while age pensioner couples will receive up to \$17.40 extra a fortnight.

"This means total pension payments for people on the maximum rate will be \$854.30 a fortnight for singles, and \$1,288.00 a fortnight for couples. This is good news for all the age pensioners in O'Connor," Mr Wilson said.

In addition, around one million allowance recipients will also benefit from increases to income support payments such as Newstart and Parenting Payment on 20 September.

Parenting Payment Single recipients will receive an extra \$7.20 a fortnight, increasing the payment to \$732.30.

Newstart Allowance, Parenting Payment Partnered, Widow Allowance, Partner Allowance and Sickness Allowance will increase by \$5.20 a fortnight for singles and \$4.70 each for couples (including energy supplement).

Mr Wilson said the increases will help pensioners keep up with rises in cost of living expenses.

"Pensions will continue to increase in March and September every year under an Abbott Government.

"The Abbott Government is pleased to deliver increases to those on the Age Pension, Disability Support Pension, Carer Payment and veterans' income support.

"This is on top of our election commitment delivered earlier this week to annually index the income thresholds for the Commonwealth Seniors Health Card to CPI," he said.

DUNCAN REJECTS PREMIER'S GOLDFIELDS SHIRE AMALGAMATION PLAN

12 SEPTEMBER 2014

A proposal to amalgamate the northern goldfields shires, mooted by the Premier in Parliament on Wednesday, has been totally rejected by Member for Kalgoorlie Wendy Duncan MLA.

"What the Premier and his metropolitan Ministers don't get, is that these Shires are already servicing vast areas of the State from a very small rate base and making them bigger would just make it unwieldy and untenable," Ms Duncan said.

In Parliament on Wednesday, during a debate on a motion rejecting the government's local government amalgamation process, the Premier indicated support for amalgamation of the northern goldfields shires because they are not viable and do not provide extensive services. The Nationals crossed the floor to support the motion.

Ms Duncan said that she had already heard from the Shire of Leonora CEO, Jim Epis, who made it quite clear that his local government is not dependent on grants and subsidies and is quite viable in its current state.

"The irony of all this is that the Premier, a couple of weeks ago, stated that driving 30 or 40 km in a bus from Onslow is an occupational health and safety issue for Chevron workers and then he expects unpaid local government councillors to drive hundreds, if not thousands of kilometres to Council meetings."

Ms Duncan said that one councillor on the Shire of Laverton has to drive over 300km on a gravel road to get to meetings, the President of the Shire of Leonora has to drive over 100 km from Leinster to Leonora to undertake his duties and the Shire of Menzies has councillors at Tjuntjuntjarra, over 600 km away.

"To get to Tjuntjuntjarra, Menzies councillors have to drive over rough dirt roads or pay over \$10,000 in air charter fees. This means that they are at risk of losing councillors who are unable to attend the required number of meetings."

At The Nationals State Conference last weekend a motion to withdraw support from the metropolitan local government reform process was carried unanimously because of comments by the Premier and the Minister for Local Government that indicated the regions would be next.

"The Nationals do not support compulsory local government amalgamations. What we do support is a Private Members Bill introduced by Nationals Member for Moore, Shane Love, that will enable regional local governments to set up a legal entity to undertake projects for mutual benefit while retaining their local representation," Ms Duncan said.

loe Vera is a clump-forming perennial with dense rosettes of thick, spiky grey-green leaves and tubular yellow flowers in summer. The young leaves are often spotted red. A. vera var. officinalis has softer leaves, which are spotted and streaked white.

Medicinal properties

Aloe Vera is said to have healing properties. In fact, it has been used

medicinally for centuries. It has been identified in wall paintings in

ancient Egypt, where it was apparently used to treat catarrh. Alexander the Great supposedly used aloes to heal his soldiers' wounds. In

traditional Chinese medicine the pith and mucilagi-

nous gel from inside the leaves is boiled, sweetened with honey, then refrigerated and taken as a tonic. (Note: pregnant women, nursing mothers and children should not take aloe vera orally.)

While there are many claims about the medicinal benefits of Aloe Vera, there is no doubt that this plant has both antifungal and antibacterial properties. Rubbing the mucilaginous gel onto a recent burn or cut definitely helps healing.

Cultivation

Aloes like a sunny situation and must have well-drained soil or potting mix. They are frost sensitive, but can be grown in pots in cold climates and kept in a protected, sunny position during winter. Aloe Vera is the perfect container plant as it requires little water. Overwatering will cause the base of the plant to rot. (Tip: allow the potting mix to virtually dry out between waterings.) You can pot up an Aloe Vera plant using a mixture of one part washed river sand to four parts of good quality potting mix



SHIRE OF MENZIES ROAD CLOSURES

The Shire of Menzies advises that pursuant to Section 3.50(1a) of the *Local Government Act* 1995, it proposes to close a number of roads in the Menzies Shire.

The purpose of the closure is due to the road becoming no longer important and with a low traffic count. Other reasons are safety conditions associated with overgrown vegetation, poor running surface conditions and narrow grids which collectively make maintenance costs extremely expensive.

A map showing those roads is available from reception at the Shire office during normal opening hours of 8.30 am to 4.30 pm.

Submissions objecting to the proposed closures will be received by the undersigned up until 4.00 pm on Monday, 10 November 2014. Any submission received will be presented to Council on Thursday, 27 November 2014.

FROM THE ORDINARY MEETING OF COUNCIL, THURSDAY 25 SEPTEMBER 2014

LOCAL PLANNING POLICY LPP12 – OUTBUILDINGS: Council has amended the Local Planning Policy LLP12 – Outbuildings to enable the Shire Building Surveyor to approve buildings such as sheds on properties prior to a dwelling being constructed on the land. This process will streamline the approval process and make it quicker for applicants to gain approval directly from the Building Surveyor. After a mandatory advertising period of two weeks, the policy will come into effect.

REVIEW OF SHIRE ROADS: Council has begun the process of closing certain roads in the Shire that have little or no traffic using them. This action is an attempt to ensure that the roads that are listed in the Shire Road Inventory are maintained on a regular basis and those roads that serve little purpose are closed. The act of closing these roads does not mean that the road is closed to all traffic thereafter, what it does mean is that the Shire will be no longer responsible for the maintenance of that road, which will reduce the Shire's exposure to liability in the event of an accident along that road. A full list of those roads is found in this edition of the Menzies Matters.

LAKE BALLARD ASSOCIATION INC: Council has resolved to write to the Minister for Lands seeking his approval to have the Management Order currently made in the name of the Lake Ballard Association Inc cancelled and made out in the name of the Shire of Menzies. This has come about due to the complexities in the ability of the Lake Ballard Association Inc to operate efficiently under the Rules and Regulations of their organisation. The request to the Minister will also include a commitment from the Shire to form a Committee of Council to manage the Lake Ballard site. That Committee will consist of equal numbers of Councillors and Traditional Owners who will report back to Council. This process will take some time to finalise and further

POLICY ON THE RETENTION OF STOCK GRIDS: Council has adopted a Policy on the retention of stock grids throughout the Shire. This Policy, which will address the existence of narrow grids on Shire roads, will be looking to remove grids where there is no serviceable fence adjoining the grid. Since the demise of the pastoral industry, many stations have let their fences deteriorate to the extent that the grids serve no purpose as the fences are non existent. There are other means of stock control that will be implemented in the place of the grid.

EXTRAORDINARY ELECTION: The Shire will engage the Western Australian Electoral Commission to conduct an Extraordinary Election on 18 December 2014. This election was brought about due to a vacancy in the Rural Ward. Further details of this election will be made public as it becomes available. In the mean time, residents are urged to ensure that their names are on the electoral register, please contact Ms Carol McAllan at the Shire office for any information regarding this process.

Abbott Government commits \$406m for preschool certainty

5 September 2014: The Abbott Government will commit \$406 million to ensure O'Connor families can continue to access up to 15 hours of preschool per week in 2015.

Federal Member for O'Connor Rick Wilson confirmed the Commonwealth is offering Western Australia an extension of the current national partnership arrangement for preschool funding for a further 12 months after they expire in December 2014.

"This announcement is first and foremost about giving our local parents and preschools certainty for next year.

"Recently I have had a few concerned constituents worried about the access to preschool next year. This is a great win for families in O'Connor."

The Abbott Government is committed to supporting high-quality early childhood education and care for Australian families. This \$406 million for preschools is one more example of this.

"The \$406 million extension of the national partnership arrangements gives us time to carefully consider future policies without unnecessarily impeding parents and preschools looking for certainty next year.

"Extending the national partnership for 12 months is a common-sense approach, given the current Productivity Commission Inquiry into Child Care and Early Learning is not due to hand its report to the Government until late October this year," Mr Wilson said.

The Government will also take into account findings from an independent review into the current national partnership on preschools, the Federation White Paper and the review of the National Quality Framework governing child care and early childhood learning quality standards and regulations.



National Stronger Regions Fund applications open

Learning a second language can be child's play

22 September 2014: Federal Member for O'Connor Rick Wilson is encouraging interested local preschools to nominate for a place in the 2015 Early Learning Languages Australia trial.

Mr Wilson said expressions of interest are now open for the \$9.8 million trial at up to 40 preschools nationwide.

"This is a fun, easy and economical way to get our children interested in learning a second language early on in their education journey."

"This is also a great way for us to promote inclusive communities, with the latest figures indicating about one in five Australians speak a language other than English at home."

Proposed languages for the trial at this time include Chinese (Mandarin), Japanese, Indonesian, French and Arabic

The Early Learning Languages Australia (ELLA) trial involves study through online foreign language software in preschools, via play-based apps on tablet devices and will be open to all preschools with a standard internet connection.

"This will particularly benefit regional, rural and remote communities, where technological advancements such as this are helping to ensure families in the bush get the same access to high-quality early education as their city counterparts."

The ELLA trial is an election commitment and part of the Abbott Government's longer-term vision for improved access to language studies throughout a child's education.



Dolphin Tale 2 continues the story of the brave dolphin Winter, whose miraculous rescue and rehabilitation—thanks to the invention of a ground breaking prosthetic tail—made her a symbol of perseverance to people around the world and inspired the 2011 hit movie "Dolphin Tale."

Several years have passed since young Sawyer Nelson (Gamble) and the dedicated team at the Clearwater Marine Aquarium (CMA), headed by Dr Clay Haskett (Connick Jr), rescued Winter, a young dolphin who lost her tail after being entangled in a crab trap. With the help of Dr Cameron McCarthy (Freeman), who developed a unique prosthetic tail for Winter, they saved her life against all odds.

In turn, she helped save the Aquarium—as people came from far and wide to see the courageous dolphin firsthand, enabling CMA to greatly expand their mission to "rescue, rehabilitate and, when possible, release" injured animals.

Yet their fight is not over. Winter's surrogate mother, the elderly dolphin Panama, passes away, leaving Winter alone and grieving, unwilling to engage with anyone, even her best friend, Sawyer. However, the loss of Panama may have even greater repercussions for CMA. The USDA warns Clay they will have to move Winter from the Aquarium because regulations require these social creatures to be paired. If they don't find a female companion for her—one that she accepts—CMA will lose their beloved Winter. But as time runs out, there may still be Hope...

2 tablespoons lemon juice

1 tablespoon vodka (optional)

1 tablespoon finely chopped fresh dill


100g smoked salmon, cut into 24 strips

- Fill pastry cases with cream cheese mixture. Top with salmon and dill sprigs. Serve.

Preheat oven to 200C. Line 2 baking trays with baking paper.

Preheat grill on medium-high. Cook sausages under preheated grill, turning, for 6-8 minutes or until golden brown and cooked through. Remove from grill and set aside to cool.

Use a small sharp knife to cut the pastry into 1cmthick strips. Lightly brush pastry with a little egg. Wrap 2-3 pastry strips around each sausage to resemble bandages, leaving a little gap at one end for the face. Trim and discard excess pastry. Place on the lined tray. Repeat with remaining sausages, pastry and egg.

Bake in preheated oven, swapping trays halfway through cooking, for 20-25 minutes or until golden brown and puffed. Remove from oven and set aside to cool slightly. Use the American mustard to decorate the mummies with eyes. Place on a serving platter, serve with mustard and tomato sauce.

One in two Australians will experience a mental illness at some point in their lives.

One in five Australians will experience a mental illness in any year.

Odd socks day...because anyone can have an odd day, is a light-hearted approach to reminding people that anyone, at any time, can have an odd day. It is a national campaign to help address stigma associated with mental illness.

Stigma can have a devastating impact on the lives of people with mental illness and their families, friends and carers. It influences how they are viewed and how they see themselves. Stigma can happen anywhere – at home, school, work, hospitals, sporting clubs. If we are to work towards a society where every person is valued, respected, and belongs, we must address stigma.

People living with mental illness want the same basic things as everyone else:

- · A home somewhere decent to live
- A job or something meaningful to do a reason to get up in the morning
- A life worth living friends to share your life with and give you hope.

Stigma can stop people with mental illness from achieving these basic needs. As a result they may live less satisfying and contributing lives than they would like, and are able to. The community is much poorer as a result too.

Feeling that you belong is an important human need. Having friends, local connections and activities you enjoy, as well as making a contribution to your own or to others' wellbeing – all help make life worthwhile.

Myths – such as that people with depression are weak and should just pull their socks up, or that all people with psychotic illnesses such as schizophrenia are unpredictable and to be feared – are hurtful and harmful as well as being inaccurate. Dispelling these myths is important if people with mental illness are to be fully accepted into families, workplaces and communities.

On Saturday mornings Mrs Thomas goes and sings for people at the Southern Cross Nursing Home.

Mrs Thomas will attend the awards presentation in Perth on the 8 November 2014.

"It is great to have one of our goldfields seniors in the running for the award. Irene would be a perfect recipient; she is an inspiration to us all that she is still so active and thinking of others at the age of 81," Ms Duncan said.

O'Connor councils get \$14 million in Roads to Recovery funding

30 September 2014: Federal Member for O'Connor Rick Wilson MP has welcomed the \$14 million that the 43 O'Connor local governments will share in 2014-15 as part of the Australian Government's \$2.1 billion Roads to Recovery programme.

The untied grants provides local governments with another funding source to be used to construct and maintain local roads.

Mr Wilson said Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Infrastructure and Regional Development Warren Truss is writing to all councils advising them of their full allocations for the 2014-15 to 2018-19 Roads to Recovery programme.

"The Roads to Recovery programme is an important programme for regional local governments and this year's allocations is great news for local councils, residents and businesses.

"The programme enables councils to prioritise roads funding to invest in the infrastructure which keeps our drivers safe and strengthens economic growth. These funds will make a real difference in building roads, repairing streets and creating better access across our communities.

"As announced in the 2014 Federal Budget, our Government is doubling Roads to Recovery payments to councils next year (2015-16) to \$700 million, which will be a tremendous windfall for much-needed local road works," Mr Wilson said.

The Roads to Recovery programme is set up for councils to make road spending decisions based on local needs - without interference from Canberra - to ensure funding is truly directed to where it is most needed in the community.

The Australian Government has extended Roads to Recovery for another five years to ensure councils receive the funding they need to ensure local roads are safe, communities are well connected and freight movements are efficient.

The 43 O'Connor local governments will receive their funding allocations in November. The breakdown of funding is:



Halloween is a celebration observed on 31 October, primarily in regions of the Western world; the traditions and importance of the celebration vary significantly between geographical areas. Halloween is a time of celebration and superstition. It is thought to have originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off roaming ghosts.

Halloween or Hallowe'en is derived from "All Hallows' Eve", the eve or vigil before the Western Christian feast of All Hallows (or All Saints) which is observed on 1 November. Halloween begins the triduum of Hallowtide. Halloween is growing in momentum in Australia, in spite of seasonal differences and the transition from spring to summer. Criticisms stem largely from the fact that Halloween has little relevance to Australian culture. It is also considered, by some Australians, to be an unwanted American influence; as although Halloween does have Celtic/European origins, its increasing popularity in Australia is largely as a result of American pop-culture influence. Supporters of the event claim that the critics fail to see that the event is not entirely American, but rather Celtic and is no different to embracing other cultural traditions such as Saint Patrick's Day (an Irish tradition).




